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latest radio treasure. Capacitor trouble in older radios can lead to serious trouble, such as destroying a power transformer. Capacitors, especially paper caps can go bad in a couple of ways. Usually they either "short" out (big trouble) or become "leaky." Your best bet in most old radios loaded with paper caps is to replace them. Electrolytic capacitors are the ones that sometimes can be brought back to life by reforming. Bringing an old radio up slowly with a VARIAC is sometimes enough to reform some old filter caps. One thing to be aware of when replacing caps in old radios is not just the value of capacitance, but also the working voltage of the cap. The working voltage should always be the same or greater than the one you are replacing. Most of our technical presentations bring a lot of lively input from the club members. This subject was no exception. Questions can up about capacitor testers, how to retain the aesthetic value of the set, and which cap is the best. One of the members, Jiri Placek, suggested checking out the following website for information on capacitors www.faradnet.com. There were also a number of suggestions on the best way to go about replacing capacitors. All in all an interesting session.

In addition to the technical talk, Ted also did refreshment duty this month. He was filling in for Alice and Jan who were unable to attend. Thanks again, Ted.

After refreshments, we moved on to the regular auction. The usual round of test equipment, radios, some hi-fi gear, magazines and books changed hands. A nice unusual home-made set also was part of the auction.
