By wiring a secondary in series aiding or opposing you can either "boost" or "buck" the line voltage. Sure, there are other ways to achieve the same results, but if you have a box of transformers that you just

got at a DVHRC auction...

Always ready with some interesting to add to a technical talk, Ted Sorwicka brought an interesting item – a blast from the past, you might say. First up he showed us a Zenith alignment tool. This was used on Zenith sets with push-button tuning. While it was included with Zenith sets with this feature, it is seldom seem today.

Ted is also a great imnovator (or improviser.) Many collectors of virtage radios would like to play back vintage radio programs of period music through their carefully sestored sets. Ted showed off a "Radio DJ Studio" - a kiddie toy at best; however, it is a broadcast station that can be used to play whatever you want through you vintage sets. It



includes a cassette recorder and a microphone. Also, there is an auxiliary jack to plug in a CD player or other source. The unit is available at "Toys R Us" for about \$20,00. Other report is being available for \$10,00 on "eBay." As an aside, the transmitting frequency is about 1610 kHz, so you, too, could be your very own TIS (Travelers Information Service.)



Lewie Newhard showed off an Emerson (electro-static) TV he recently repaired. Lewie wanted to point out some repair tips when dealing with this type of set. Lewie says to look at this type of set as an oscilloscope when trying to repair. Lewie says there are six 6000 volt capacitors that will need replacing. Lewie was touting the stability of the set. As he was doing that, the set began to roll. We all got a good laugh at his expense. Laughter aside, this was another great restoration job by Lewie. Somehow, even the drivel that passes as current TV programming doesn't look bad on a vintage black and white set.

Mark Thiesback, a very active collector and restorer, showed

off some photos of a recent TV acquisition. The set itself was too big and heavy to bring to the meet. At a Keesport, NJ auction, Mark managed to outbid a few others for a TRK-90 set. From all accounts he got a bargain—even though the price mentioned was too steep for my blood.

The December meeting will be held on December 10, 2002 at the Telford Community Center. Start time is 7:30 PM. It will be our holiday feast. Also, do not forget the election of officers. We will welcome anyone who wants to pay their dues for 2003. (That's \$15.00 for the year.) If you know of someone who shares your interest in radio collecting, encourage them to join DVHRC.

DVHRC: A Personal Diary of Our First Ten Years

Author's Note: A conversation with Tony Molettiere last month made us both realize how long we'd been at this, and how the club might commemorate the organizations first decade. Somewhere, there's a snapshot that Tony took of the thirteen people at the inaugural meeting of the DVHRC.

Should he be unable to find it by publishing deadline, may this fictional, but fact-based journal, serve as a chronicle of our club's history. As one of the faces in the photograph, I figured if somebody didn't write it all down, some of our newer faces would never know how our Second Tuesday of the Month ever came to be. In addition, it's a nostalgic look back and a salute to all the older faces.

SEPT EMBER, 1991: There have to be others out there somewhere. I mean, I met a bunch of AWA guys at the swapmeet up in Tranquility, this spring, but most of them were from New York and New Jersey. You'd think that in an area like Philly, so rich in history (Philoo, Atwater Kent, RCA and so forth) that there would be a club around here that catered to old radio collectors.

OCT OBER, 1991: There's a new book out called Evolution of Radio, light on text but heavy on pictures ... mostly taken by collectors themselves. Some are better than others. The major drawback is that the values are listed in back of the book, instead of by the photo or description. I prefer Marty Bunis' price guide. If there's any extra value to Evolution, it's that it lists the contributors' names and addresses. There's a guy named Jay Daveler in Lansdale, PA with a place called "Radio Attic". I'm gorma have to check him out!

DECEMBER, 1991: Was thumbing through Antique Radio Classified and found a guy in Quakertown, PA with abunch of old radios. His name's **John Kern**, and he'd send me a list of what he had for sale. Drove by the address for Jay Daveler's place only to find another business called "Davro Optical". I guess "Radio Attic" moved. Maybe I should place an ad in A.R.C. and start a club on my own.

(End of) JANUARY, 1992: Tose through the February issue of A.R.C. as I usually do ("For Sale" ads first, articles second, "Wanted" ads last). Nothing of real interest this month except Gerald Schneider's article on radio club management. Some interesting food for thought. Maybe starting a club by myself would be more than I could handle alone. That thought aside, I turned to the back section to see if any Spring Swapmeet dates had been announced. And there it was on page 74:

I could barely contain myself. I called the number for information and got an answering machine message for Davro Optical. Aha! So Radio Attic was indeed on Cannon St. in Lansdale. And this Daveler fellow must have something to do with this new antique radio club. Can't wait for February 4th!!!

Feb ruary 5, 1992: (The day after) I hardly know where to begin. Last night was everything I'd hoped it would be... and more. I arrived shortly before 7. First, the meeting place couldn't be better suited for a radio club. The building is owned by North Penn Amusements, who are apparently involved in jukeboxes and pinball machines which, along with hundreds of radios, were in profusion. The first person I met was Sylvia Molettiere, a charming blonde lady with an ummistakable Tarheel accent. She took some time to personally show me around the place and introduced me to her husband Tony, who told me about their business and their interest in the hobby. I also (finally) met the founder of the club, Jay Daveler. All together, there were thirteen people at that first meeting. Jay, serving as President, welcomed everyone, explained how he and some of his radio friends got together and got the organization off the ground. The remainder of the officers were Vice President, Larry Hilgner, Treasurer, John Kern (another familiar name from the pages of ARC!), and Tony as secretary. One by one, we all stood up and introduced ourselves and told a little bit about collecting interests. Pete Grave and his wife Jan were from Ottsville and were avid RCA and Hallicrafters people, Arnold Finkel and his wife were art deco collectors from Allentown, and Charlie Class from North Wales who liked all kinds of old radios. (Note: Your author clearly recalls 13 in attendance at the first meeting, but can only account for 11. Can anyone fill in the blanks?)

Jay went onto explain that the group's primary function was to bring area collectors together to share knowledge, resources and friendship....and reminded everyone that it was our club to develop as we wished. Numerous ideas were proposed for group activities, including swapmeets, a library, repair and restoration workshops, and monthly club auctions. Pete said he'd start snooping around for potential swapmeet sites. Arnold, an auctioneer by trade, volunteered to develop the auction program and hopefully have it up and running by the next meeting. I agreed to do my part by using my multiple media contacts to help spread the word about the AHRS. Our final order of business was a discussion about our next meeting where it was decided that the second Tuesday of the month would be more accommodating than the first. After an exchange of addresses and phone numbers with the promise to get in touch before we assembled in March, we called it a night.

I'm jazzed. Finally, the beginning of a local vintage radio network.
