

The Radio Collector's Library by Dave Snellman

The idea for this series of articles came to me the other night. I've seen a number of articles and presentations on how to fix, repair, and restore radios and the like, either in print or presented at one of our meetings. I've observed individuals referring to schematics while repairing and aligning radios. These schematics usually come from bound Rider volumes or SAM's PhotoFacts. We announce new books for collectors when they first hit the market. These books usually have theme of detailing some aspect of collecting vintage electronics. These might be a book on the Zenith TransOceanic, one on RCA's 45 players, or it might be on vintage guitar amplifiers. I see tube manuals and ARRL Radio Handbooks sell well at our auctions. I thought it's about time to compile a list of books that collectors should have in their reference library. As many of us have progressed in our collecting endeavors we find it necessary to do research on our findings. While the Internet has been a great boom to collectors, many of still prefer books, hence, I'd like to present what I call "the radio collector's library."

I'll start with a listing of books for those just starting out in the hobby. Many of these books help identify particular makes, models as well as providing photos of the set. Some will deal with basic electronic theory, troubleshooting problems, and simple repair. Collector information makes up parts of these books. This includes the year manufactured as well as typical pricing for the set. You will find certain titles are readily available through booksellers, some may be available at your local library, and others may be out of print and hard to find. This last group usually turns up at antique radio swapmeets.

Books for beginners

When I think of books for beginners, two readily come to mind. They were both written by Morgan McMahon. The titles are Vintage Radio, 1887-1929 and A Flick of the Switch, 1930-1950. These two books give you a capsule history of early radio, the people involved in its start-up, and information on the programming you would hear at the time. The books are filled with many black and white photos of vintage sets and re-prints of radio advertisements. While the photos do not show a lot of detail, they are valuable in identifying many early sets. The date of the set is also provided. It would only take you a hour or two to go through each book cover to cover, but you'll find yourself referring to the photos and info available many, many times.

The next two books I would place in the beginner's category were also written by the same individual. Both are in their second edition, too. David Johnson's <u>Guide to Old Radios</u>, <u>Pointers</u>, <u>Pictures</u>, <u>and Prices</u>, <u>2nd ed</u>, and <u>Antique Radio Restoration Guide</u>, <u>2nd ed</u>, are the titles. The first title is just what its name implies — a book full of pictures (some in color,) a price guide (somewhat dated,) and information on the development of radio. Tips for first-time buyers is also included.

The second title begins to take a "look under the hood" to see what makes a radio work. It takes you through basic electronic theory, troubleshooting problems, and basic cabinet repair. There is also a section on what you need to service your radios. This book doesn't go into repairing specific models, but does lay down the basic

Two more books round out the beginners section. How to Repair Old-Time Radios by Clayton L. Hallmark This book picks up where Johnson's Antique Restoration Guide stops. It is full of more detailed information on how a radio works, on how the various components function, and how to read a schematic. Many more tips and tricks fill the book. It also delves into aligning your radio.

Fixing Up Nice Old Radios by Ed Romney is by far the one essential book for beginners. The author was first trained at the Signal School at Fort Monmouth, NJ and later taught electronics at a number of electronics schools. The book gets you started with the basics — what you need in terms of tools and test equipment. It also emphasizes SAFETY (as do many of the other books.) Theory is presented in a straight-forward manner. Then the book moves on to "teaching" you how to repair sets by using a case history approach. Early regen sets like the Crosley 50 and Radiola III are detailed. Atwater Kent radios are covered in the early AC section of the book. Superheterodyne sets are introduced and the All-American Fiver is covered in detail, from repair to alignment. Multi-band sets, such as consoles from the 30's and 40's are covered. The Zenith TransOceanic portable is covered, model 8G500YTZ1 to be specific. If HI-FI is your thing, this book covers more complex radios and early hi-fi gear, and this is a good basis for developing troubleshooting skills. Ed finishes with a look an early amateur radio gear — both receivers and transmitters. The Harvey-Wells Bandmaster transmitter is examined. Receivers covered include the Hallicrafters S-20 and the National NC-100. I could go on and on about this book, but I recommend you pick one up for yourself.
