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

National Broadcaster's Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony at Info Age Learning Center

After a ten year histus, an induction ceremony was held on September 16, 2006 at the InfoAge Learning Center in Wall Township, New Jersey, for the National Broadcasters' Hall of Fame. The inductees were selected by Art Schrieber, the Hall of Fame founder. They included: Charles Osgood, Arthur Anderson, and Les Paul.

Charles Osgood, nationally recognized news commentator and author was the first inductee. You see him Sunday mornings on TV. He also has many books to his credit.



Arthur Anderson, vocal actor, was the next inductee. No, this is not the accounting firm founder. Anderson is best remembered for being the voice of "Lucky," the Lucky

Charms cereal leprechaun! He has also appeared in many TV shows throughout his career.

Les Paul, renowned guitarist and inventor of the electric guitar, rounded out the trio of inductees. Unfortunately, due to health reasons he could not attend the ceremony.

The induction ceremony coincided with the re-opening of the National Broadcasters' Hall of Fame museum in conjunction with the New Jersey Antique Radio Club's museum.



The ceremony was made possible through the efforts of InfoAge, Art Schreiber (NBHF founder,) the New Jersey Antique Radio Club, and Barbara Ruane, the event chairperson

Following the luncheon and remarks, inductees and attendees were treated to a tour of the newly established NJARC and NBHF museum in building "9032." "9032" is the army designation for the hotel annex, built in 1940. This facility is larger than the Marconi Cottage, NJARC's original museum location. Inductees were also treated to a tour of the facility—riding in a vintage command car, courtesy of the Military Collectors' Group.

Other organizations will have displays open on Sunday's. OMARC, the Ocean-Monmouth Amateur Radio Club, will have its displays open at the "Diana" site, also part of Info Age. New Jersey Historic Divers Association will have many artifacts retrieved off the coast of New Jersey available to view. MARCH, the Mid-Atlantic Retro Computer Hobbyists, will have various computers on display. An Apollo space craft computer is also on display. You might even see some of the vehicles that are part of the collection of the Military Collectors' Group.

Farnsworth honored in Philadelphia.

On September 6th in Philadelphia's Wyndmoor neighborhood, television pioneer Philo Farnsworth was honored by the Pennsylvania State Historical Commision with a roadside historical marker that is used throughout the state to honor historical events that took place at that location. In this case, it was the site of Farnsworth's Philadelphia studio in the 1930's, licensed as W3XPF. It was the home of his final research in to the development of the Image Dissector camera tube, the forerunner of all electronic image devices for the complete television system.

The cathode ray picture tube had already been developed, but the camera end remained a mystery. Television had developed to the point that mechanical cameras were being used with the picture displayed on an electronic tube. Farnsworth gave us the first tube capable of "high definition" television of the day. But his tube was not capable of low light reproduction and did not have image storage for a smoother picture. Zworikin and RCA finished the race with the I conoscope shortly



afterwards and television never looked back leaving Farnsworth to move on to Indiana building televison receivers and ultimately to a sad end in Maine in 1971.



The site he chose after his departure from Philco is on high ground north of the Chestnut Hill section of Philadelphia. The studio building is long gone as is his original tower. Still a popular site for repeater signals, his tower was torn down in the late 40's and replaced with the tower that stands today. The replacement tower became the home of Philco's W3XE and then WPTZ until they left for the high ground in the Roxborough antenna farm and the KYW call letters that continue today. W3XPF moved to Indiana and became W3XFT for a short time.
