Meeting of March 12, 2024

The theme was *Green Radios* which was in tune with St. Patrick's Day. The radios varied in their makeup but tended to be in the mid- century modern era where vibrant colors, geometrics and jet/atomic age stylings heralded this modern age in America. The various greens tended mostly towards turquoise. Please note that lighting and photography may be somewhat inaccurate as compared to the human eye on sets captured.



Above: How many shades of green can there be? The number is infinite but paint and pigment manufacturers came up with distinctive names for each hue.



Above: Al Simmons shows one of his first restorations which was a 1951 Motorola 5RI using 4 tubes and a selenium rectifier. Earlier versions of this style cabinet, the 5R15 used the 35W4 AA5 standard tube lineup. Al said that there was much cigarette nicotine to be cleaned in each of 84 indents (eightyfour, each with 4 inner surfaces) requiring much effort to clean to its current luster. Many cue tips were used to clean these dust and debris catchers leading to a real eye catcher. The simple geometric design is timeless and includes the "waveform" logo tuning dial of 50's Motorola's, signaling the atomic and space age of the mid-20th century.

Below: Dan Schwartzman brought in a French radio he picked up while in Paris. This "Francis" model of 1953 was produced by Radio J.S. (Joie et Satisfaction, Paris). This 4 band superhet sports the streamlined European look. Below: Bob Seiwall's stable of Philco Transistone TH4's painted in vibrant colors always makes the cut on Kutztown Radio show photo essays by John Hagman. .Bob prides himself in including exact reproductions of the back panels which are usually missing.



In the past this included having an industrial metal stamper fabricated for pressing out thick cardboard via his CAD

designed pattern, and reproduced labeling for the perfect backing of these AA5 loctal- tubed sets.

Below: Donna Acerra shows a 1956 Dumont RA-354 portable in a deep "hunter" green leather casing. It is a 4 tube + selenium rectifier in the time of transition to transistor sets. This set aka the "Beachcomber" has a nicely galvanized chassis to resist corrosion.







Allen Dumont developed an improved version of the Cathode Ray tube paving the way for commercial television among many other electronic innovations. His early life included overcoming polio. While bed-ridden for a year, his interest in radio was spurred on by his father. His experiences in manufacturing under Westinghouse and de Forest led to founding his own company to develop innovative products, especially in the area of television. Below: Mark Thierbach displayed the Westinghouse H-125 (1945-47), aka "Little Jewell" in pale green". The radio is a tightly packed 6 octal tube set with an RF Amplifier stage. These sets were made at the Westinghouse Home Radio Division plant in Sunbury, PA.

Below: Dave Snellman showed his collection of green transistor radios. The turquoise 1958 Emerson Vanguard model 888 8 transistor set named after the US Navy pre-NASA Vanguard rocket and satellite of 1958.







Above: Looking head on, this is surely one of the strangest radio cabinet designs ever conceived- are those two long-stemmed bulbs encircling the tuning dial and volume dial supposed to be mushroom clouds? Cabinet is "Neverbreak", made of Cellulose Acetate Butyrate. Powered by 4 AA batteries in a delicate holder, replacement battery holders are available from "Childhood Radio" via EBay.



Below: The 1961 Zenith "Royal 400" 7 transistor radio featured two toned lime green cabinet with matching speaker grill. Introduced as a lower-cost version of the Zenith Royal 500H, it featured the same large oval (off-centered) extended range Jensen speaker, although audio output was not as great as the 500H.





Above: The rear of the 1961 Zenith "Royal 400" highlights the two-tone lime green and convenient stand. This set retailed for \$39.95 in '61 **Below:**Dave also showed the Sony 1960 TR-84 8 transistor "Super Sensitive" radio employing a tuned RF stage. In awesome light lime to mint green, we've reported on this radio in past Oscillator issues too! Inner workings also shown. Notice the 3 gang variable capacitor and the battery holder of 3 C cells. It sold for \$54.95 in 1960.





Below: Monty Purviance has got 4 nice green sets lined up for your eye candy enjoyment. The first Admiral model is a 4 tube 1958 although other similar models had been transistorized by this time.



Below: Here is a two-tone Hallicrafters 612 from 1954 with an RF preselector stage using an additional 12BA6.



Below: An 1952 Emerson 850 4-tuber and a rare 1954 Bendix 853C AA5 clock radio were shown by Monty.



Below: Terry Skelton shows a Zenith Royal 200. This 7 transistor model from 1958 featured a 3 ½ inch speaker and retailed for \$45. This model's unique feature was its size. At 6 1/2 inches tall, it is larger than most other coat pocket styles and rivals the Emerson 888 series in that way. It's awkward size and fragile plastic case contributes to the fact that it is hard to find these without some kind of cabinet damage. Royal 200's were offered in brown, white, green, and coral colors with green and coral (shown below) being the hardest to find.



Below: Wilbur Gilroy recently acquired this beautiful green Catalin Emerson Aristocrat Model 400 tube radio, a rare find from the Art Deco era of the 1940s.

In advance of this display NMIH will need to find the following items, and we hope some club members might be able to loan possibly from their personal collections including the following: 1) Wireless Morse Key, c. 1900–1910

- (preferably Marconi-made).
- 2) Homebrew crystal radio, must be dateable to pre-1918 (we have an undated one)
- 3) Quaker Oats or Mother's Crushed Oats Radio Receiving Set made by Marguette Radio Corporation, 1921-1924
- 4) US Army Signal Corps radio transmitter/receiver c.1918 e.g. SCR-54, SCR-65
- 5) Radio "A" Battery for pre-1927 radio receiver (club member already offered to supply this item)
- 6) One of the following superheterodyne radios:
- a)Silvertone 115 radio, or another b)Silvertone (Sears, Roebuck brand) model, 1928-1939

c) Sparton "Bluebird" or other mirrored front radio receivers (566, 1186, 517, 557, 558, 409-GL), 1935-1939 d) Emerson FC-400 "Patriot" radio receiver, 1940-1941 e) RCA Victor Little Nipper "La Siesta" Model 40X-53, 1939

The Boss Says

In his autobiographical book "Born to Run", chapter 8, entitled Radio Days, Bruce Springsteen paints a picture of his formative years and summer evenings in his Freehold, NJ childhood experience. Here is just a short excerpt that we too may share of those nighttime sightings of pulsing red lights and the towers that "wore" them.

My mom loved music, Top 40 music; the radio was always on in the car and in the kitchen in the morning. From Elvis on out, my sister and I shuffled out of bed and downstairs to be greeted by the hit records of the day pouring out of the tiny radio that sat on top of our refrigerator.

Through my mother's spirit, love and affection, she imparted to me an enthusiasm for life's complexities, an insistence on joy and good times and the perseverance to see the hard times through. Has there ever been a more comforting, sadder song than Sam Cooke's "Good Times"? It's a vocal performance steeped in weary self-knowledge and the ways of the world. "Get in the groove and let the good times roll...we gonna stay here 'til we soothe our soul.... if it takes all night long...."Slowly the musical sounds of the late fifties and early sixties drew down into my bones.

On warm nights, with the windows in our big sedan wide open, first we'd roll down Main Street, then on to the southwest end of town to the edge of Highway 33, where we'd make our scheduled stop at the Jersey Freeze ice cream stand.

Later, we'd ride the back roads to the north end of town, where scratching the sky in the fields bordering the Monmouth Memorial Home was the town radio tower. It had three bright red lights rising along its gray steel structure. As our radio glowed with the otherworldly sound of late-fifties doowop, my mother would explain to me that there in the high grass stood a tall

dark giant, invisible against the black night sky. The ascending lights were merely the shining red "buttons" on his jacket. We would always end our journey with a ride past the "buttons". As my eyes grew heavy and we turned toward home, I'd swear I could see the outline of the giant's dark figure.

I can remember looking from my backyard Hanover Township home and seeing the flashing towers of the WKAP 1320 three miles distant with its multi-tower directional array and how they captivated my imagination, having received their signal on my Remco crystal set. As the cost of maintaining such an array and the value of the real estate where located made the property on MacArthur Road's miracle mile too valuable not to convert for its owners in a struggling business, many stations have been co-located. The ubiquitous cell tower now dulls the senses of what these earlier towers meant but like Bruce, we can point out these landmarks to others as well.
